Promotional activities to protect, support and promote adequate breast-feeding in the context of COVID-19 were carried out through mass and social media.

All layers of communication under RCCE (risk communication and community engagement were employed; which includes community engagement through LHWs by providing IYCF counselling, mass media (radio messages), city branding in the form of billboards, streamers and banners and social media. National and Provincial Nutrition Working groups led by the government and co-chaired by UNICEF has been active with regular weekly and bi-weekly coordination meetings. The focus remained on the nutrition response to CO-VID-19 pandemic and the Global breast feeding week

Altogether 34.1 million were reached through UNICEF social media, while 83 millions were reached through Radio via 41 channelsacross the country

COVID RESPONSE OVERVIEW

ecognition of emergency and activation of coordination response mechanism commenced in late March. Letter for Continuation of Nutrition Services with simplified guidelines for health workers on IYCF, MAM/SAM and SC in CO-VID-19 were developed and circulated to provincial governments and all partners immediately. HSP was developed and endorsed with a value of 25 million US\$. GHRP Nutrition section was also developed and submitted (Value US\$ 11.5 million). Communication materials including Leaflets, radio spots and short video were developed and endorsed swiftly and shared with Provincial Governments and Partners. Later these were translated in Urdu and regional languages to be utilized in the field. Special attention was given to breast milk substitutes and NDMA and PDMA were taken onboard. 5w Data entry tool was developed and discussed before endorsement. This tool is being used for analysis of the response in all provinces. FAQs on Food, Nutrition and Breast feeding were also developed for call centres and circulated with partners and provinces

COVID Response plan included:

Safety for health providers, clients & caregivers at facility and community Treatment of acutely malnourished children and PLW at health facilities/ mobile nutrition services


Micronutrients supplementation for children and pregnant & lactating women

ounselling session of mothers and caregivers were regularly held with all safe practices at nutrition sites and in community.

During the period of April till June 2020 a total of 649818 caregivers were counselled on different topics related to IYCF based on the Simplified Guidelines for the delivery of IYCF in the context of COVID 19- Pakistan, developed by the National Nutrition Working Group.




These guidelines were disseminated throughout the country and workers were trained on these guidelines.


mart lockdown and access to the nutrition sites for nutrition workers and the community had been the biggest limitation to reach our targets during the last four months. Inspite of all limitations, most nutrition sites remained open even with reduced staff or mobile clinics were setup at different areas where needed to continue the treatment.

Approximately 69526 children under five were admitted in out-patient therapeutic programme in different provinces during the period of Arril till June 2020. While another 1363 children under five with severe acute malnutrition and complications were admitted in stabilization Centers




SCREENING OF CHILDREN UNDER 5




TREATMENT OF SAM CHILDREN UNDER 5

GLOBAL BREAST FEEDING WEEK - HIGHLIGHTS

lobal breastfeeding month was celebrated throughout the month in all provinces of Pakistan. IEC material such as banners and RCCE flyers on optimal infant and young child feeding were printed and provided to partners in the field. Highlights are presented below

SINDH

adio messages on breastfeeding were aired on FM radio all over Sindh from 7 August to 16 August, reaching to approximate 10.07 million population.

Awareness campaign on breast-feeding in COVID context was carried out through Cable TV network for 10 days. Messages were being aired all over Sindh on Breastfeeding and IYCF practices in context to COVID-19.

City branding on GBW in COVID context carried out; billboards in Karachi, Sukkar, Larkana were displayed, banners installed on all key locations including DC, DHO offices, hospitals and main public places.

PUNJAB

ocial media campaign was conducted on IYCF in COVID context, to raise awareness among mothers about the of importance of breast-feeding during COVID pandemic. Through this effort 13,500 were reached with the message.

Approximately 266,256 beneficiaries (mothers/caregivers) reached with nutrition messages on BF and IYCF by LHWs in community. While 43,983/mothers/caregivers reached with nutrition messages on BF and IYCF by Health facility-based staff at 1710 nutrition facilities across Punjab. Another almost 25,000 people/caregivers in waiting areas of HF OPDs were reached through Health facilities-based LEDs, nutrition messages on BF and IYCF in COVID-19 context.

reast feeding week was also celebrated in Khyber Pakhtoonkhwa with all possible and new innovative ways. Five hundred banners were provided to partners to be displayed on the health facilities, DHO Offices, MTI Hospitals and other significant location all over KP and NMDs.

75,000 flyers printed and provided to field staff and NMDs. 19,481 mothers were counseled on optimal infant and young child feeding in the context of CO-VID. Almost 14,303 HH were reached with nutrition RCCE messages though distribution of RCCE Flyers.

The WBW Social Media Package (developed by UNI-CEF) reached over 300,000 individuals via FB pages, Whatsapp groups, local news/media pages /web portals and the MTI hospital social media cells in the month of August.

13.404 million reached with nutrition RCCE and IYCF messages in COVID context messages through 25 Radio Channels across KP and NMDs.

In collaboration with PHA- KP (Public Health Association), one minutes video messages on the importance and promotion of breastfeeding has been recorded by women parliamentarians and these are being circulated widely to create awareness among the masses (a total of 4 videos, so a new video is shared every week). The reach of each video shared on weekly basis is an estimated 50 thousand.



RISK COMMUNICATION AND COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

IYCF Counselling at Nutrition Sites: Counselling on IYCF in COVID context while maintaining social distancing and practicing IPC (Simplified guidelines developed and disseminated among service providers).

Social Media (Facebook, Twitter, Instagram)-Social media video. Mass media (Radio spots)-Radio Live programs. WhatsApp as a channel for messages on IYCF

NNWG REVIEW OF COVID-19 RESPONSE

eview of the Nutrition Sector COVID-19 response, covering March to July 2020, was held on 14th July, and was participated by all provinces. It was recognized that the sector successfully ensured continuity of nutrition services despite constraints posed by the COVID-19 pandemic.

Partners developed and disseminated modified simplified guidelines on promotion of IYCF and wasting management, to ensure safety of service providers and of the child / caregivers. In addition, notifications on service continuity and on protection against violation of Breastmilk Substitute Code by milk industry were issued and disseminated.

Nutrition sector also pre-positioned essential life-saving nutrition supplies. Challenges related to funding, service coverage, information management and lack of PPEs for frontline workers were identified as major bottlenecks.

COORDINATION FOR A EFFECTIVE RESPONSE TO THE PANDEMIC

he Nutrition sector coordination led by government and co-chaired by UNICEF continued to coordinate the nutrition response to COVID-19 pandemic at federal and provincial levels. Coordination Meetings were held on weekly basis at National and provincial level till June 2020. The frequency of meetings are now on biweekly basis.

Taking into consideration the fact that nutrition sector contribution to the COVID-19 pandemic is to support continuity of essential nutrition services to reduce excess morbidity and mortality related to the pandemic, the National Nutrition Working Group (NNWG) revised initial targets related of number of children enrolled and treated for Severe Acute Malnutrition (SAM) and number of mothers / caregivers counseled for adequate and safe Infant and Young Child Feeding (IYCF) Practices. New target for number of SAM cases is raised from 70,000 to 277,630 while number of mother / caregivers to be reached by counseling on adequate and safe IYCF is increased from 380,800 to 1,110,747.

THE NATIONAL NUTRITION WORKING GROUP WAS ACTIVATED IN MARCH 2020 IN RESPONSE TO THE COVID-19 CRISES THROUGH-OUT THE COUNTRY. LIKEWISE PROVINCIAL NUTRITION WORKING GROUPS WERE ALSO ACTIVATED AT THE SAME TIME, WITH MEETING FREQUENCY RANGING FROM BI-MONTHLY TO MONTHLY IN THE VARIOUS LOCATIONS. AT NATIONAL LEVEL, THE GROUP IS LEAD BY THE FEDERAL MINISTRY OF HEALTH, AND LEADERSHIP AT PROVINCIAL LEVEL IS PROVIDED BY THE PROVINCIAL HEALTH DEPARTMENT AGENCIES WITH THE UNITED NATIONS CHILDREN'S FUND ACTING AS CO-LEAD AT NATIONAL AND PROVINCIAL FORUMS.

THE NUTRITION OBJECTIVES OF THE NNWG PARTNERS ARE TO AS FOLLOWS

- * MAKE NUTRITION SITES SAFE FOR SERVICE PROVIDERS AND THEIR CLIENTS
- * CONTINUE TREATMENT OF MALNOURISHED CHILDREN AT HEALTH FACILITIES
- * MICRONUTRIENTS SUPPLEMENTATION FOR CHILDREN AND PREGNANT AND LACTATING WOMEN
- * COUNSELLING ON INFANT YOUNG CHILD FEEDING
- * SOCIAL MOBILIZATION AND COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT
